FROM PRINCIPAL LEAH KEUSCHER

Espero que nuestro boletín informativo, *The Quarter Horse*, le provee información útil sobre este primer parte del año escolar. Recibirá un número de nuestro boletín informativo cada tres meses, entonces, buscar en sus buzones de correo cerca del 1 de noviembre, el 1 de febrero y el 1 de mayo.

El tema de este año es SUPER: "Marvel vs. DC". Nuestro personal, el liderazgo estudiantil y los mentores de Link Crew han trabajado arduamente durante todo el verano para garantizar que los estudiantes experimenten un año "súper".

iLa escuela comienza lunes, el 8 de agosto a las 8:00 am en punto! Si usted está conduciendo su estudiante a la escuela, por favor llegue temprano y ser conscientes del límite de velocidad (10 mph) y de nuestras zonas rojas y amarillas. Para la seguridad de su hijo/a y otros, estamos pidiendo que <u>no dejen a su hijo/a en zonas rojas</u>. En vez, utilizar la zona amarilla, o estacionar en un lugar de estacionamiento para descargar su estudiante. iGracias por su atención a este asunto!

En el primer día de clases, comenzaremos el día con nuestra clase de seminario (anteriormente llamada "Advisory"). Vea el horario de la campana del primer día en la próxima página. Los estudiantes pasarán los primeros 56 minutos conociendo a su maestro de seminario y sus compañeros. Durante el seminario de esa mañana, los estudiantes recibirán su planificador de estudiantes, así como una copia de su horario impreso. El planificador de estudiantes contiene una parte del manual de reglas y procedimientos que los estudiantes deben seguir. Por favor, tómese el tiempo para pedirle a su hijo/a que vea a su planificador y que lo revise con él / ella. La última página de la porción del manual tiene una hoja de firmas requerida tanto para usted como para su estudiante. Requerimos que la página firmada sea devuelta al maestro de seminario de su estudiante durante la primera semana de clases.

Somos una escuela cerrada para el almuerzo para estudiantes freshmen de primer año (noveno grado) y sophomores de segundo año (décimo grado). Todos los juniors (II^{0} grado) y seniors ($I2^{0}$ grado) recibirán privilegios fuera del campus para el almuerzo hasta el 13 de agosto, cuando recibirán su identificación del día de la foto. Luego, los estudiantes de 11 ° / $I2^{0}$ grado - que están en camino a la graduación - continuarán con el almuerzo fuera del campus, y aquellos estudiantes de $I1^{0}$ / $I2^{0}$ grado - que no estén en camino de graduarse - deberán permanecer en escuela durante el almuerzo. Todos los estudiantes pueden obtener privilegios fuera del campus simplemente asistiendo a tutoría después de la escuela o academias de los sábados. Si su estudiante realiza el trabajo, con mucho gusto le daremos un pase para el almuerzo fuera del campus. Si prefiere que su estudiante no salga de la escuela para almorzar, no dude en ponerse en contacto con el consejero de su estudiante o nuestra II dicina de Servicios Estudiantiles. Para las próximas tutoría después de la escuela y las fechas de la Academia del sábado, consulte nuestro calendario escolar en www.woostercolts.com.

I hope our newsletter, *The Quarter Horse*, provides you with information about this first quarter of school. You will receive an issue of our newsletter quarterly – so check your snail mail around November 1. February 1. and May 1.

This year's theme is a SUPER one: "Marvel vs. DC". Our staff, student leadership, and Link Crew mentors have been working hard all summer to ensure students experience a "super" year.

School will start promptly at 8:00 am, Monday, August 6th! If you're driving your student to campus, please arrive early and be mindful of the speed limit on campus (10 mph) and our red and yellow zones. For the safety of your student and others, we're asking that <u>you do not idle</u> in red zones to drop off your student. Instead, use the yellow curb area, or park in a parking spot to unload your student. Thank you for your attention to this matter.

On the first day of school, we will be starting the day with our seminar class (formerly called advisory). See the first day's bell schedule on the next page. Students will spend the first 56 minutes getting to know their seminar teacher and fellow students. During seminar on that morning, students will receive their student planner, as well as a copy of their printed schedule. The student planner contains a handbook portion of rules and procedures that students must follow. Please take the time to ask your student to see his/her planner and to review it with him/her. The last page of the handbook portion has a required sign off sheet for both you and your student. We ask that the signed page be returned to your student's seminar teacher during the first week of school.

We are a closed campus for lunch for freshmen (9th graders) and sophomores (10th graders). All juniors (11th graders) and seniors (12th graders) will be given off campus privileges for lunch until August 13th — when they will receive their IDs from picture day. Then, 11th and 12th graders who are no track for graduation will continue with lunchtime off campus privileges, and those 11th/12th graders who are not on track to graduate, will be required to remain on campus during lunchtime. All students are able to earn off campus privileges by simply attending after school tutoring or Saturday Academies. If your student puts in the work, we'll gladly give him/her an off campus lunch pass. J If you would rather your student not leave campus for lunch, please do not hesitate to contact your student's counselor or our Student Services Office. For upcoming after school tutoring and Saturday Academy dates, check our school calendar on www.woostercolts.com.

As we continue through the 18-19 school year, I understand the importance of communication and I commit to communicating in as many ways as I can to suit your family's needs. My team and I will communicate via *The Quarter Horse*, e-mails, and ConnectEd calls. And of course, we're happy to communicate in person (puedo hablar en español). We do our best to keep our office doors open; if we're on campus and available, please feel free to come by and see us! If you need to schedule a more formal meeting with me or any of my administrative team, my assistant would be happy to schedule a time for you. 

2018/2019 WOOSTERSCHOOL FEES

- All students are required to pay a one-time book deposit of \$20. This fee is refundable at the end of senior year (or when you leave Wooster).
- A parking permit of \$5 is required of all students with a valid drivers license who are parking their car on campus.
- If you are not an athlete, but enjoy watching games, then it is more affordable to pay your Student Activity Fee of \$25. The one time fee gets you in to all Wooster games for free. (Non-refundable)

This past year we were very busy with student programming and parent involvement. This upcoming year is very crucial for GEAR UP as our students are now Juniors and Seniors. This coming year we will be preparing students for their post-secondary option, informing students and parents on financial literacy, and preparation for graduation. Some events and activities that we have coming up this year include GEAR UP Leadership Council, community service opportunities, Senior boot camps, college visits and so much more. Welcome Back Colts!

We are excited to work with our families to make this the best school year ever! Remember, one of the key indicators of how successful a student will be in school, is their family's level of involvement with their school. Now is the time parents should sit down with their children to set **academic, behavioral, and social goals** for the 2018/2019 school year. Help your child create a vision of what their 2018/2019 school year will look like.

- What GRADES will your child strive for?
- Are they ATTENDING school every day?
- Which **EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES** will he or she participate in?

Once the goals are set; **how will you support and monitor these goals?** Wooster can help! Silvia Gil our Family Graduation Advocate, your child's counselor and I would love to get every family and student set up on Infinite Campus (IC). IC has an app for your smart phone that allows parents and students to monitor grades and attendance daily. As teachers input grades and attendance into IC, notifications are sent to your phone. This is a great way for you to stay connected with your child's academic progress. Effective monitoring is especially important for students who have struggled academically in the past. If your child needs help meeting their academic goals, we have interventions throughout the year to assist all students.

- ♦ **After school tutoring** is held in the Career Center, everyday but Wednesday, from 3:00 p.m.-4:00 p.m. **Tutoring starts Monday, August 27th**, and runs through the end of the school year. All students are welcome! They will have access to computers, a quiet place to study and tutors in various subjects to assist with questions.
- ◆ **Saturday Academies** give your student an extra four hours to work on homework, retake math exams, finish a lab or work on an essay. Teachers are there to help in any way they can. Saturday Academies start in September and will be held on **September 8th**, **September 22nd and October 20th**, in the Career Center from 9:00 a.m.-1:00 p.m.
- **Gallop to Graduation** parent meetings are design to educate families on the requirements for high school graduation and how to prepare students for post-secondary options. Meetings are held the 3rd Thursday of every month from 8:00-9:00 AM in the Career Center.
- **Fall Break Catch Up Camp** will take place the week of October 1st. Any student who is failing or at risk of failing a core class is welcome to come.
- Counselors will identify students in need and notify families. Intervention calendars are available in the front office.

STUDENT PLANNER

Students will be receiving a student planner the first week of school which includes the school calendar with important dates, bell schedules, academic information, as well as common information regarding school policies and procedures. An electronic version of the handbook is available at www.woostercolts.com under the Academic tab. There are common concerns we work to address each year, so please be sure to access the website or review your student's planner the first week of school if you have questions.

ATTENDANCE POLICY CHANGES

Parent/guardians must send a note or call the school regarding any absence within three days of the student returning to school. Calls or notes *in advance* are encouraged. Nevada Revised Statute 392.122 is the basis for the WCSD Attendance Policy and Procedure 5400. The policy in its entirety is on the WCSD website https://www.washoeschools.net/Page/8789. The WCSD Board of Trustees has established a policy requiring 90% attendance for promotion to the next grade or earning credit. The emphasis of the attendance policy is on the importance of keeping students in school and providing access to the curriculum.

TEMPORARY EDUCATIONAL PLACEMENT (TEP)

This code is used when a student cannot physically attend school due to circumstances beyond the student's control, and the student desires to keep up with his/her class and will be returning to the brick and mortar class in a defined period of time. This code may also be used when a student is awaiting placement in the Home Hospital program (in these cases the TEP Homework Log would need to be completed).

TEP may also be used if a student is absent but make-up work is returned to the teacher within the timeline (number of days absent plus one, starting the day the work was provided by the teacher. The is responsible for requesting the work from the teacher.

90% ATTENDANCE LAW

Students who miss more than 7 unexcused absent periods of a class will fail the class due to the 90% Attendance Law at Wooster High School. Following are Unexcused Absences:

- Unverified (AUK) absences: Any absence that is not verified by a parent/guardian within three days after the student returns to school counts against the 90% rule.
- Confirmed Truancies (CT): A confirmed truancy is recorded when the student, school, or parent confirms the student should
 have been in school but was not.
- Medical Absences: This absence documents a parent has provided a note that the student was ill and counts against the 90% Attendance Law. A note from a health care provider is excused.
- Domestic (DOM) absences: A Domestic is any absence for family related business reasons and are not Emergency Family Business.
- Note /Call after 3 Unexcused (NCU): When a parent note or phone call is received after the 3-day deadline, the absence is unexcused but the fact that the note/call was received is recorded. This absence will count against the student's retention.
- Runaway (RWY): If a student is confirmed as a runaway, the student is withdrawn on the 11th day because the whereabouts of the student is not known.
- Absences Prior to Triggering Failure (APT): Absences for any reason the parent /guardian approves (7 for Earl Wooster High School). A phone call or note within 3 days of the absence for the absence to be excuse.
- If make-up work is completed within the timeline. (Number of days absent plus one). The attendance will be coded Temporary Educational Placement (TEP) and it will not count as part of the eight, and will not count against the student's retention or failure

Absences that <u>do not count</u> against the 90% attendance rule, but will count toward Chronic Absenteeism unless the make-up work is completed and returned. Students must miss 10% or more of school days to be labeled Chronically Absent. A note or phone call must be received from the parent/guardian by the office within 3 days of the initial absence for the following codes to be used for an absence:

EMD –Medical Professional Excused Absence; for a student to be excused for being sick, a health care professional note must be provided.

RH – Religious Holiday

FCA – Foster Care Absence; Absence related to being in foster care

<u>SUS</u> – Out of School Suspension (Does not require a parent note)

<u>HDE</u> – Health Department Excluded Medical used in school wide outbreaks declared by the Health Department.

<u>CIT</u> – Child in Transition Absence; Absences related to homelessness.

<u>EFB</u> – Emergency Family Business limited to severe family based emergencies such as death of a human family member.

School Activity (SCH): An activity sponsored by the school or school district.

MAKE-UP WORK

Students will be provided with the opportunity to request and complete assignments, exams and quizzes that are missed due to a student's absence or for periods of missed instruction for any reason. Activities that are participatory and contributive in nature may be difficult to make up and alternative tasks may be provided for such work. Failure to request or return completed make-up work and missing work that cannot be made up will result in a grade reduction for the missed work and the absence will remain unexcused.

DRIVERS LICENSE & PARKING PERMITS

A friendly reminder that students parking on campus must purchase a parking permit and have their drivers license in possession when operating a vehicle on campus. Students found driving without a license will have keys confiscated, parent/guardian notified, and will receive a citation. Speed limit on campus is 10 miles per hour and parking permits can be purchased for \$5.00 from the bookkeeper.

CELL PHONES

Wooster is supportive of students responsibly using the tools of the 21st Century. Please remind your son/daughter that personal/social phone use must be conducted outside classroom time. Students may use cell phones for classroom activities when given permission by the classroom teacher. Being engaged and present in class means demonstrating personal responsibility and taking a time-out from the phone. Teachers and administrators reserve the right to confiscate a student's electronic device if it is interfering with student learning.

Here are some tips which will help our students stay grounded in the present through practice:

Set times when cell phones aren't allowed to be used at home (example: 2 hours before bed time or during dinner). Consider having your student turn off the notifications to their social media apps.

Set up longer periods of times (days, weeks) where your student doesn't have access to technology, or challenge them to "unplug" for a week.

Talk to your teen about following school rules and being present in class rather than texting under the desk, snapchatting the classroom experience, or updating their profiles.

Remind your students that taking or transmitting photos/videos of other students or adults without their permission on a school campus is against the law.

WANT TO BE YOUR TEACHER'S HERO? BE PRESENT. BE ON TIME.

The importance of each student being on time to class can often be forgotten. There is a four-minute passing time between classes and this is long enough to move from one any classroom on campus to another. Wooster takes into account at the beginning of each school year that 9th graders and newcomers to the school need to learn how to navigate their schedule and find their classes. Some reminders as to why we challenge students to get to class on time:

- The code for tardies is EMI or UMI meaning (E)xcused or (U)nexcused Missed Instruction. To be late is to miss instruction.
- It is disrespectful to the time of teachers and other students in class to walk in late.
- To be on time is to demonstrate self-discipline and time-management.

Some ideas on how to get to class on time:

- Plan the least congested route to class
- Don't get distracted walking between classes.
- Let your friends know you need to get to class to earn great grades and avoid consequences for being late.

Consequences for being late to class follow a progressive discipline plan and tardy passes are handed out at the Student Services Office. Consequences include, but are not limited to:

- 20 Minute Lunch Detention
- After School Beautification
- Saturday School
- In-School Suspension

In World Languages, classes for "Native Speakers" are now called "Spanish Literacy" classes. We are also aligning our performance skills district-wide and will give common district finals, based on communication skills.

The district has approved new textbooks for all our languages and classes (except for Arabic) so our students will benefit from brand-new and up-to-date resources. With these, they will have access to amazing online tools in order to monitor their own learning experience.

Besides teaching their own classes, our EL teachers will continue co-teaching in order to provide the best academic opportunities to our English learners.

Lastly, together as a team, we are happy and proud to announce our bi-literate population has increased since last year. We awarded Seals of Bi-literacy to a greater number of students in Spanish/English, French/English, and Arabic/English. In 2018-2019, we will pursue our efforts to promote an even stronger bi-literacy culture at Wooster.

EXAM FEES - NEW THIS YEAR – Fee payment deadlines have changed: A \$40 deposit *per AP exam* is due on or before **Sept 28**th. Any IB student wishing to take an AP exam must register for the exam in August with Mrs. Lienau. If a student is enrolled in an AP class, exam registration is automatic. The remaining balance of fees is due on or before **Nov 1**st. IB exam fees are also due by **Nov 1**st. Please plan accordingly for payment of exam fees.

Per WCSD policy, a student enrolled in an IB class is required to take the IB exam associated with that class. Each IB exam will be approximately \$122. If your student is a junior in the IB program, or an IB course student (not attempting full diploma), there is also a registration fee of approximately \$180. Furthermore, a student enrolled in an AP class is required to take the corresponding AP exam (\$94). Testing fees tend to average \$400-\$600 during the junior year and \$500-\$800 during the senior year. You may begin paying at any time, and you may make payments as well. As overwhelming as it seems, this cost is relatively miniscule compared to the price of college credits; remember if your student scores well on their IB and AP exams, they will earn college credits. Please check with each college's AP/IB score cutoff to find out more information, or see your student's counselor.

Back to School—What you need to know for MYP in the 2018-2019 School Year

As our summer comes to an end, we are getting ready to welcome students back to campus here in Colt territory.

Our new incoming 9th grade students will join our IB family as Middle Years Programme students. In all of their 9th grade classes, students can expect to engage in Inquiry-Based learning with their teachers. In addition to core classes, 9th grade students will also take Individuals and Societies and World Languages, which are classes designed to broaden their scope of learning and their understanding of the world around them. Additionally, students will begin their Service Learning experiences in their first year at Wooster. Service Learning is a great opportunity for students to learn about our area and help others. Service Learning helps students to build great skills, become better learners, and learn about themselves.

Our incoming 10th grade students will continue to engage in Inquiry-Based learning in their classes and will begin their Personal Projects. Personal Projects are a great way for students to turn a personal passion into a sustained project that challenges them outside of the classroom and helps them apply the skills they learn in the classroom to personal experiences. The projects will be supported in English classes and advisory classes this year, with students creating Research Process Presentations to share their Personal Project research findings with their English classes and working through the Personal Project stages in advisory classes. Personal Projects are due at the end of February each year, with our culminating Personal Project Showcase in April. However, students can expect to begin work on the project in late August or early September, with support from advisory teachers.

Supports and more information: students have access to after school tutoring and Saturday Academies where they can access help from teachers and our MYP coordinator. Whether it is help they need in a class, help with Service Learning opportunities and reflections, or help with the Personal Project, all Wooster teachers have worked with MYP students and can guide students during these after-hour supports. For information on the schedule, please see our intervention calendar.

The IB program coordinators, Ms. Grose, Ms. Lienau, and Mr. Coli, will also hold several IB 101 Information nights for both students and parents to gain more information about our three IB programs (IB MYP, IB Diploma, and IB Career). AP EXAM FEES – New this school year

Due to changes initiated by College Board concerning the ordering and payment of Advanced Placement exams, beginning this fall, for the 2018-2019 school year, all AP exams will be ordered in the fall. AP exam fees must be paid **PRIOR** to the exam being ordered; therefore, a **minimum \$40 payment per exam** will be **due by September 28**. The remaining **\$54 per exam** (or **\$14 per exam** if the student receives Free/Reduced Lunch) will be **due** on or before **November 1**.

Per Washoe County School District Administrative Regulation 6501, all WCSD students enrolled in an AP course are **required** to take the exam in that course. Failure to take the AP exam will result in the 'AP' designation being removed from the student's transcript and loss of the .50 boost to the student's overall GPA. Due to this requirement, if the minimum **\$40** deposit per exam is not paid by **Sept 28**:

the exam(s) will not be ordered,

the student will be immediately re-scheduled in the non-AP version of the class(es), the 'AP' designation(s) will be removed immediately from the student's transcript.

If a student decides to register and pay for an AP exam **after** the November deadline, the student will also incur a late fee imposed by College Board. **Schedule of Fees:**

2019 AP exam fee\$94.00 per exam2019 Free/Reduced Lunch AP exam fee\$54.00 per exam

Late payment/ordering fee \$134.00 per exam (\$94.00 + \$40.00)

Cancellation fee prior to March 1 \$40.00 per exam
Cancellation fee after March 1 \$94.00 per exam
