Mitski, born September 27, 1990, is an American singersongwriter whose music blends rock, pop, and classical influences to create a unique sound. One interesting fact about her is that no one knows the name of her cat. Mitski's childhood was far from typical—she lived in 13 different countries, which helped shape her worldview. She sang in her high school choir, and at the age of 18, while living in Ankara, she wrote her first song on the piano.

After high school, Mitski moved to the United States to attend SUNY Purchase College's Conservatory of Music, where she studied studio composition. While in college, she recorded and self-released her first two albums, Lush (2012) and Retired from Sad, New Career in Business (2013). These albums were originally part of her senior project. Mitski has said that the music industry made her feel like a "super-saturated version of con-

sumerism," and she began to regret using her real name to release music because it no longer felt like an expression of her true self. She feared that if she continued in the industry, she would start creating music she didn't care about.

Among her biggest successes are the following albums:

Puberty 2 (2016): This album was praised for its lead single, "Your Best American Girl," and its themes of isolation, depression, and growing up. It was featured on several "best albums of 2016" and "best albums of the 2010s" lists.

Laurel Hell (2022): This album made the top ten in several countries. The song "Working for the Knife" showcases Mitski's vocal range and explores themes of alienation in the music industry.

The Land Is Inhospitable and So Are We (2023): The third single from this album, "My Love All Mine," became Mitski's first song to chart on the Billboard Hot 100.

What she loves most about making music is that it allows her to give something of herself to the world.

She has said that her music is a place to express her emotions, and that she has a deep passion for pop

music because it's what she grew up listening to. However, she also fears the commercial side of the music industry, particularly the idea that her listeners might interpret her music in a way that doesn't reflect her true experience.
